Nature lovers bring a halt to tree chopping exercise in Vasant Kunj

Verhaen Khanna of the New Delhi Nature Society said, “The Forest Department had only sanctioned ‘light pruning’ of the 95 trees which is different from ‘heavy pruning’ and ‘headbacking’, as per guidelines. In light pruning, branches of approximately 20 cm girth can be cut. But the South MCD Horticulture department, on being prodded by some residents, chopped off branches of 80 cm girth.”

“We condemn this behavior by some narrow-minded people as we can’t destroy our environment for their sake. In winter, they want sunlight and trees chopped. In summer, the same sunlight will be too harsh for them and they will sit indoors and switch on their air conditioners complaining of Delhi’s heat and pollution,” Khanna said.


Some residents in Lajpat Nagar’s I-Block were getting 12-15 trees pruned by the MCD staff recently. Other residents saw this and got agitated.

Initially they were clueless – as in who to inform or complain to. Then they contacted me through my Facebook page. They sent me photos and the address of the place where this incident took place.

When I reached the spot, I asked the men who were cutting the trees to show the documents or permission letter. But they were not able to produce any. They disappeared after I told them that I am calling the police. The police came, but were not helpful at all. They said if it were done by the MCD, then no permission is required. But from my experience, I know that even if MCD, DDA, PWD they ordered it, permission is required.

SHORTCOMINGS Report in HC says agencies underestimated two major issues – traffic and water

NEW DELHI Located in the heart of the city with proximity to transit nodes, it could have been a model for development of exciting areas in the future. But the East Kidwai Nagar Redevelopment Project has become a major cause of concern, as two key issues – traffic and water – have been ignored.

A report, submitted to the Delhi High court by Indian Institute of Technology Delhi (IIT-Delhi) professor Geetam Tiwari, has stated that the increased traffic load caused by the project could result in congestion on Ring Road and Aurobindo Road. Meanwhile, concerns about water supply to the complex, spread over 86 acres, have also been raised by the high court which has asked the concerned agencies to explain how water requirements would be met.

Urban experts said that the shortcomings in such vital issues set an example of "how not to plan a project".

In a first of a three-part series, IIT takes a look at issues plaguing East Kidwai Nagar project and efforts made to decongest the area.

NOT ON TOD NORMS
 The traffic issue, urban experts say, could have been addressed if the project was developed as per the transit oriented development (TOD) norms mentioned in the Master Plan of Delhi 2021. "Parking spaces in the complex is more than the parking spaces as per the recommendation for TOD zone," read the report.

The IIT-Delhi report says this is the "first project" developed as per the "new guidelines notified by the Delhi Development Authority (DDA) for TOD". The National Institute of Urban Affairs (NIIUA), which has developed the complex, clarified that "it is not a TOD project".

AK Mittal, chairman and managing director of NBCC, said, "The TOD policy has not been notified yet. This project has been developed as per the redevelopment norms for group housing notified in APP-2011. The parking provision is as per the prescribed norms." The project was approved by the Unified Traffic and Transportation Infrastructure (Planning and Engineering) Centre (UTIPEC) in 2013.

The TOD policy was notified by the Centre in 2015 and regulations for its operationalisation were issued in 2018. In 2017, DDA had roped in the National Institute of Urban Affairs (NIIUA) to revise the policy. According to a senior DDA official, "The policy is under revision, NIIUA has recently submitted its recommendation."

Transport experts say Kidwai Nagar was an ideal location for the implementation of TOD. "This falls under the TOD influence zone. It was developed as per TOD norms, the traffic problem would have been addressed as parking spaces would have been reduced. It would have encouraged the use of public transport. This is a lesson for future developments," said Anumita Roy Chowdhury, executive director research and advocacy, Centre for Science and Environment.

'UNDERESTIMATED' TRAFFIC FORECAST
 The impact of the project on existing infrastructure and traffic should have been assessed in detail, say experts. According to the IIT-Delhi report, the traffic circulation assessment is based on a 2010 traffic survey. The report says that NBCC "underestimated" the increase in traffic load and there is "no estimation to project traffic for future".

With pollution acquiring epidemic proportions in the city, environment experts stress on the need for a traffic impact assessment before granting permission. This project was approved by the UTIPEC – the apex body for approving road and transportation projects – and State Environment Impact Assessment Authority (SEIAA), which is the main body for environmental clearance.

"The project has got all necessary approvals," said Mittal.

"The traffic assessment is being done in post-facto manner. The traffic forecast should have been analysed at the time of giving approval of the project. UTIPEC and SEIAA should have looked into the traffic and pollution problem in detail," said Kanchi Kohli, environment campaigner and researcher with the Centre for Policy Research.

WATER WOES
 Another major concern is water. The high court has asked for clarity on how water requirements for the project would be met.

Initially, NBCC had asked for 3,700 kilo litres per day (KLD) of water from the New Delhi Municipal Council (NDMC). This included both fresh and treated water. Fresh water is generally used for drinking, while treated water is used for activities like horticulture, flushing etc.

However, in an affidavit in the high court, NDMC had stated that it can give only 2,400 KLD of fresh water. Any further requirement of water would not be met by the Delhi Jal Board.

In an application to vacate the stay over the handing over of commercial plots in the complex, NBCC later informed the court that it would now need 2,665 KLD of fresh water.

According to NBCC, the total requirement of water is 5,066 KLD of water (both fresh and treated). Out of this, 2,665 KLD would be fresh water, while the rest would be treated.

"This still leaves a deficit of 265 KLD of drinking water between NBCC's requirements and what the NDMC has said it would be able to provide. The high court, meanwhile, has directed NDMC to "clearly indicate" the source of the water that would be supplied supply to area. In redevelopment projects, it is mandatory to reuse recycled water, as a result the demand for fresh water is reduced by 35-40%. There is a need to prioritise the fresh water usage in redevelopment projects, as giving additional water is not possible in the present situation," said Praveen Bhargava, former chief nodal officer, Delhi Jal Board.

Bhargava said that the real challenge is in providing water in new developments. Residents of Dwarka and Vasant Kunj had to fight a long battle to get water supply. Even today large parts of Rohini and Narela are facing acute shortage of water.

'HOW NOT TO PLAN'
 While urban planners and designers say that densification through redevelopment is the way to go for cities like Delhi and Mumbai, they stressed on assessing the need for based on ground situation. Arunava Dasgupta, head of urban design, School of Planning and Architecture, said, "These projects can't be planned in isolation. There is a need to factor in the metro connectivity and accordingly plan for parking requirement. The impact of the

MHA transfers south DM to Mizoram

Officials Say Moving Of Tak, In News For Crackdown On Encroachments, An Individual Transfer

MOVE COMES AS A 'SURPRISE'

Retreiving around 2,600 bighas of land in Meluar, Asola, Bhatti, Dera Mandi, Ayaragar, Tughalabad and several other villages allegedly occupied by powerful religious sects, politicians, self-styled godmen, influential businessmen, etc. through anti-encroachment drives

The transfer comes four days after a public notice was issued by the south district administration on action against massive violation on section against massive violation on section in Asola, Shahpur and Dera Mandi villages. The anti-encroachment drive was planned at the end of December.

While a majority of the forest land freed from encroachers was handed over to the forest department, a 72-bigha patch, which was freed in April this year, was handed over to the gram sabha for the construction of a Delhi University girls college, a senior government hospital, a IIR sewage treatment plant, a community centre, a park and road. Many of these projects have been pending for long due to lack of land.

Over a dozen new waterbodies are proposed to be developed on the reserved land, which would ultimately play an important role in maintaining and restoring the ecological balance.

The government has formed a committee to find the best possible public use of a huge mansion in Dera Mandi village built on encroached land. The mansion may probably be turned into an old age home.

MHA transfer comes four days after a public notice was issued by the south district administration on action against massive violation on section in Asola, Shahpur and Dera Mandi villages. The anti-encroachment drive was planned at the end of December.

Delhi government officials were surprised at the move as it is not a routine administrative reshuffle, which is done after the meeting of the joint chief authorities, but an inter-state transfer.

With the approval of the competent authority, Amjad Tak IAS (AGMUT 2006) has been transferred to Mizoram from Delhi and SHS Shashank IAS (AGMUT 2007) has been transferred to Delhi from Mizoram, an MHA order dated December 4 stated.

A DM is usually posted for three years. Tak's transfer has been initiated after two years. He took over as the south DM in October 2016.



Illegal Tree Felling at Vasant Kunj

After complaints were received regarding violation of conditions of permission, detailed inspections were carried out twice by Forest Dept staff. All recent permissions for concerned Horticulture Wing have been kept in abeyance and offence proceedings have already been initiated.

The RWA of Vasant Kunj Sector A Pocket C were caught felling trees in the colony with the help of the MCD.. They Had the permission for "Light Pruning" which should be approximately around 20 cm girth, but in reality they had cut the trees upto 80cm girth.

After the Forest Department was informed, the tree officers visited the site to stop the illegal work but when they left the same work continued, So the Forest Department was informed again and the tree officers visited the sit eagain to stop the work. All their permissions were put on hold and the Environment Minister also tweeted about the incident.

Things to do, if a tree is being cut :

- Click pictures
- Tell them to stop immediately
- Ask them to show the Forest Department permission letter
- No permission, then Call 100 and wait till help arrives.
- Write a letter to the APCCF and CC to the DCF of your area.
- If they have permission, take the supervisors details who must be present there and contact the Forest Department .

वसंतकुंज में मंजूरी व नियमों के विरुद्ध पेड़ों की कटाई

नई दिल्ली। राष्ट्रीय राजधानी में बड़े और छायादार पेड़ों की हल्की काट-छाट के नाम पर उन्हें बड़ी क्षति पहुंचाई जा रही है। ताजा मामला वसंतकुंज के सेक्टर-ए में पॉकेट-सी का है। यहां वन विभाग के जरिए 95 पेड़ों की सशर्त छंटाई की मंजूरी दी गई थी। लेकिन, बागवानी विभाग के जरिए शर्तों का उल्लंघन कर पेड़ों की बड़ी और मोटी डालें काटी जा रही हैं।

न्यू दिल्ली में चर सोसाइटी के संयोजक और पर्यावरणविद वीरहन खन्ना का कहना है कि मौजूदा वायु प्रदूषण की समस्या के बीच पेड़ों को बचाने के बजाए वन विभाग इन्हें क्षति पहुंचा रहा है। हर तरह की छंटाई पर पूरी तरह रोक लगनी चाहिए। गौरतलब है कि दक्षिणी नगर निगम क्षेत्र के बागवानी विभाग की मांग पर 19 दिसंबर को पश्चिमी उप वन संरक्षक ने पेड़ों के काट-छाट की मंजूरी दी थी। हालांकि, वन विभाग की ओर से कई शर्तें भी जोड़ी गई थीं।

Forest dept puts tree pruning permit on hold in Vasant Kunj

NEW DELHI: The forest department has put on hold the nod given to prune trees at Vasant Kunj in south Delhi after it was found that large branches were being chopped off in the name of 'light pruning'.

"I have directed the forest department to keep in abeyance all permissions of tree pruning that were issued in Vasant Kunj. We had given permission to prune trees in Vasant Kunj. But large branches were being chopped off. I have also asked the department initiate proceedings as per law," said Imran Hussain, forest minister of Delhi.

The forest department had issued permission to the South Delhi Municipal Corporation (SDMC) on December 19, to prune around 95 trees. The permission was given for 'light pruning' which allowed cutting of branches up to 30cm in girth.

The permission also said that not more than four branches would be pruned from one tree. At least four such permissions

were given in December in Vasant Kunj area.

"We received several complaints from local residents and environment activists that large branches with more than 30cm girth were being chopped down. An inspection was carried out. Thereafter the pruning was stopped and permissions were

put on hold," said a senior official of the forest department, who did not wish to be named.

The south civic body had approached the forest department on December 16 for pruning of the trees.

"We will have to check what kind of permission for pruning was granted. I have asked the

deputy director horticulture to look into the matter," said Alok Singh, director of horticulture at SDMC.

Earlier in July this year, the forest department had to revoke the permission given to the public sector construction firm NBCC for felling trees for its colony redevelopment projects in south Delhi. There was a widespread outrage and a series of litigations were filed against felling of trees in seven south Delhi neighbourhoods for the re-development projects.

"I received information on December 26 that trees were being heavily chopped. I informed other environment activists. We saw that large branches, measuring more than 30cm, were being cut and loaded on tempos. I called the forest department and it stopped temporarily. But the chopping started again on December 27. That was when we called the deputy conservator of forest (west) and lodged a complaint. I am very happy that the permission has been put on hold," said Bindu Kapurea, a resident of Vasant Kunj.

S corp'n told to stop pruning in VK after greens report hacking

New Delhi: After green activists pointed to the hacking of trees under the guise of pruning at Vasant Kunj, the Delhi forest department has asked the horticulture department of South Delhi Municipal Corporation to "immediately cease the activity" in the area.

In a letter addressed to directors (horticulture) of south and Najafgarh zones, the deputy conservator of forest (west forest division) said the pruning permissions issued by the department are to be kept in abeyance till further orders.

Delhi environment minister Imran Hussain on Saturday tweeted that action would be taken against the violators. "After complaints regarding the violation of conditions of permission, detailed inspections were carried out twice by the forest department staff. All recent permissions for concerned horticulture wing have been kept in abeyance and offences proceedings have already been initiated," Hussain tweeted.



Bindu Kapurea, a Vasant Kunj resident who raised the matter to the forest department, said 10-15 trees have been hacked during the exercise at Sector A Pocket C of Vasant Kunj.

"The forest department had permitted light pruning of 95 trees. The exercise was done on around 32 of them, while 10-15 have been gutted. It's being called

pruning, but they have been cutting heavy logs," Kapurea said.

A forest department official said that after receiving complaints from the activists about the trees being hacked in the name of pruning, a team was sent for inspection. "Our staff went on Thursday and saw that the permission was being misused. They instructed the men to stop, but after they left, it continued. We got another message from a local activist, and we went back to find more trees damaged beyond permission. It's an offence under the Delhi Preservation of Tree Act and action will be taken against all violators," the official told TOI.

Delhi is one of the greenest cities in the country. According to Economic Survey of Delhi 2017-18, the total forest and tree cover has increased to 305.41 sq km in 2017 from 299.77 sq km in 2015. The city's green cover has also increased from around 20.2% in 2015 to 20.6% in 2017. The Economic Survey of Delhi 2014-2015 stated that the city had a tree cover of 287.81 sq km in 2013 or 20.06% of the total area of the capital.




Do Not Buy Paint Brushes Made From Mongoose Hair



In a joint raid in thirteen (13) different locations at the same time, led by Wildlife Crime Control Bureau, Government of India and State Forest Departments, over 3500 number of #Mongoosehairbrushes were seized on 10-12-2018 from Himachal Pradesh, Rajasthan, West Bengal and Uttar Pradesh. Wildlife Trust of India through its extensive volunteer-based network assisted the operation at various stages.

All six species of mongoose are protected under schedule II part II of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972 and added protection by CITES under Appendix II with a zero quota on commercial trade. About 40 grams of hair is plucked (pulled out with fingers) from the just killed, warm bodies of mongooses to be used in making paint brushes. Usually, no more than about 50% or 20 grams turns out to be of paintbrush quality as per the manufacturers. Thus, 50 mongooses lose their lives for a kilogram of usable hair.



De-Choke Trees

The Hon'ble National Green Tribunal in its order dated 23rd April 2013 has directed all Public Authorities to ensure that all the sign boards, names, advertisements, any kind of boards or signage's, electric wires and high tension cables or otherwise are removed from the trees.

They shall also ensure that the concrete surrounding the trees within one meter of the trees are removed and all the trees are looked after well and due precaution is taken in future so that no concrete or construction or repairing work is done at least within one meter radius of the trunk of trees.
